

First Year Housing Report March, 2012 Jacklyn Wells, Director of Residence Life

Summary:

Residence life is an essential part of the college experience for students at Bluffton University, especially because of the four year on campus housing requirement. As research shows, the first two years of a student's experience on campus is critical in the ability to influence student growth and retention. In the academic year of 2011-2012, the department of Residence Life at Bluffton University piloted a first-year floor for men and one for women. Bren-Dell Hall housed the floor of men and Ropp Addition housed the women. The students on these floors were placed randomly during room draw and housing assignments. Many other institutions of higher education have programs or residence halls with all first year students and Residence Life at Bluffton University sought to see how this would work for our campus.

Students on the Floor:

Students on the first year floors came from a variety of backgrounds and hometowns, and are studying a variety of majors, including education, music, accounting, youth ministry, biology, nutrition, social work, psychology, criminal justice, and environmental studies.

What services students were provided:

- First Year Seminars with other students on the floor
- Extra RA for support- 2 RAs for each of the two floors
- First year specific programming and community development activities

Results:

Students living on the two all first year floors on campus were asked a series of questions about their experiences on their floor. These questions were designed to gauge the benefits and also disadvantages of having an all first-year floor in our residence halls. 20 students total from both floors completed this survey in March of 2012.

Retention Rates from Fall 2011- Spring 2012

As shown in the table above, the first-year floor retention rate was similar, but slightly lower than the overall retention rate for first-year students at Bluffton University.

Enjoy attending Bluffton University

Overall, students on the first-year floors were very pleased with their overall experience at Bluffton, with 95% of the students who took the survey stating that they enjoyed attending Bluffton.

Effect of living on first year floor on Bluffton experience

Enhanced experience	57.9%
Hindered experience	5.3%
Neutral	36.8%

For the most part, living on a first year floor either enhanced or didn't affect students' experience at Bluffton.

Selecting a first-year floor

65% of students, if given a choice, would have selected to live on a first-year floor. 35% of students would not choose that option. If these students were given a chance to redo their first year, 84.2% would choose to live on a first year floor and 15.8% would choose to live on a mixed floor with upperclassman.

Retention for Fall 2012

Out of the 20 students who completed the survey, 85% will be returning to Bluffton in the fall.

Community

40% of the students believe that living on a first-year floor helped to strengthen their floor community. 35% are neutral on this, and 25% either disagree or strongly disagree that living on the floor helped strengthened the community.

Resident Advisors

57.8% agree or strongly agree that the RAs placed on those floors were great at helping them adjust to college life, 26.3% is neutral, and 15.8% disagree that the RAs were helpful to them as a first-year student.

Advantage over other students

Only 30% agree or strongly agree that living on a first-year floor gave them an advantage over other first-year students on campus. 30% disagree or strongly disagree, and 40% are neutral.

Recommendations for the future:

- All first year building
- 2 floors in one building with collaboration- 1 male, 1 female
- Allowing residents to choose to be on the all first year floor or if they would prefer a mixed floor
- Adding a faculty member as support
- Adding a learning in-hall component. Perhaps holding FYS in the residence hall.

How has living on an all first year floor affected your experience at Bluffton?

- Some people were very loud all the time and it made it hard to study and do homework and sleep even with my door closed.

- Without proper examples set by upperclassman, my hall mates were, unfortunately, quite disrespectful to the hall, bathroom, and kitchen. Very few people on my floor treat the building and property with the respect that is necessary when living in a college dormitory.
